COVID-19 Resources

Special Education:

- Many related services will be delivered by telepractice starting Monday, March 23, 2020. This
 includes speech and occupational therapy, and counseling. These services will be provided by
 existing providers so students will have as much continuity as possible.
- IEP meetings will occur by phone. Families can still make referrals by writing to school or calling 311.

Remote Learning:

- Still on schedule to begin Monday, March 23, 2020. Initial lessons will probably focus on how students will participate online.
- Each school will decide upon a learning platform and have its own instructional schedule and must include all courses that students receive as part of regular instruction. Classes may be for shorter periods.
- Schools/teachers should be in contact with families within the next few days to share school and student-based information, and to ask questions on student access to the internet, technology, and best ways to communicate, such as email or postal mail.

Regional Enrichment Centers:

- 100 buildings across the city will be open Monday, March 23, 2020 to the children of critical city workers, including healthcare and transit workers along with other first-responders.
- Centers will be open Monday-Friday 7:30am-6:30pm and assigned to families based on location.
